From the Dean

Re-Membering, Re-Creating, and Reflective Worship

Occasionally as a child, I would sleep-over at my grandparents' ranch where ice cream followed dinner every night and frequently there were baby animals to visit. Yet, the mornings were...well, slow. I remember wondering as my grandparents made their way through a pot of coffee, "how many cups does a person need to wake up?" What I didn't understand then was the debilitating arthritis that really caused those slow mornings. This made me sensitive to the effects of age on our bodies. So, when I heard a significant number in our community struggled to get to worship at 9 am, I took those comments to heart. So, we're going to gather for worship at 10 am from September-May. It's our way of saying to those who have slow mornings, we remember you, so we are shifting our schedule so that you may be re-membered as you rejoin us in worship.

I also heard comments from others who need time to recreate, especially during our long summer days. Taking this Sabbath time to recreate allows us to be re-created by God so that we can return renewed to face the demands of life. So, we're going to gather for worship at 9 am from June-August. It's our way of saying to those who want to soak in a summertime sabbath, we will shift our schedule to allow you to be re-created.

And I heard from a number of you who appreciate an efficient, simple, and quiet service. For these folks, every third Sunday we will have spoken worship at 8 am. We will also periodically worship in the evening and continue to offer online Morning Prayer, worship at Touchmark once a month, and Togendowagan.

Life in community calls us to see one another's needs and to accommodate one another as best as we can. Life in community is also, always, changing as the needs of people change--what works now may not work in a year. We can always adapt. Thank you for your gracious listening to one another through this process and for seeing one another.

Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Resurrection!

MAUNDY THURSDAY, APRIL 2: 6 pm Holy Eucharist with optional foot-washing (and choir). (See article about Maundy Thursday elsewhere in this issue.)

GOOD FRIDAY, APRIL 3: (no music)

- 7 am: The Good Friday Liturgy and Holy Communion (from the reserved sacrament)
- 12 pm: The Good Friday Liturgy and Veneration of the Cross
- 6 pm: The Good Friday Liturgy and Veneration of the Cross and Holy Communion (from the gifts of the pre-sanctified)

This day is marked by solemnity, devotion, and prayer, acknowledging the “wondrous Love” Jesus shares in giving his life for us. The liturgy invites us into practices that, in their power, have endured for centuries. The passion gospel—from John—and prayers for the church and the world (the “solemn collects”) have been part of the liturgy since at least the fifth century, reflecting Jesus’ love for the world and the church, which is his Body in the World. The Veneration of the Cross (a Good Friday rite for more than a millennia) brings our focus onto the humanity of Jesus’ death, and the power of the divinity of his sacrifice for us. We don’t celebrate Eucharist on the day we observe Jesus’ crucifixion and death, but we find solace and strength in Communion from the holy gifts consecrated on Maundy Thursday.

HOLY SATURDAY, APRIL 4: NOON: The Holy Saturday Liturgy (in the Chapel)

When Jesus’ body is at rest in the tomb, we offer short readings and prayers. This liturgy takes approximately 10 minutes, with time for personal devotion before and after.

HOLY SATURDAY, APRIL 4: 8 pm: THE GREAT VIGIL OF EASTER (with choir) The first Easter Mass begins at sundown, the liturgical beginning of Easter Day itself. In quiet, we kindle new fire (“The Light of Christ!”), and by candlelight we recount the story of salvation, proclaiming that the God revealed in Hebrew scriptures as the life-giver, ruler, and liberator of all creation is the same God disclosed to us in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus the Messiah. In the Eucharistic feast, we welcome the resurrected Jesus back into our lives—the lights are switched on, bells are rung, drums beaten, the organ trumpets, and we proclaim the good news: Alleluia! Christ is risen!

EASTER DAY, APRIL 5: 10 am: FESTAL EUCHARIST (with choir and brass)

We proclaim the triumphant song of resurrection in our Easter celebration with resounding brass and exuberant singing. We bedeck a cross in colorful flowers: a sign of our hope and faith in the gift of new life, as we celebrate Holy Eucharist with our risen Lord! After worship, with our guests from the YWCA, the children gather in a traditional egg hunt. Easter joy lasts for 50 days—longer than Lent. The Great Fifty Days conclude with the gift of the powerful Holy Spirit on Pentecost, May 24. (Pentecost means, literally, “the fiftieth day.”)

What is Maundy Thursday?



Those of “a certain age,” who grew up (like me!) in The Episcopal Church with the 1928 Book of Common Prayer, had no knowledge of Maundy Thursday liturgies. That was a “new-fangled” innovation of those zany editors of the “new” 1979 prayer book ... right?! Well, no. Not exactly. Turns out it was a liturgy already more than 1600 years old!—when it was added to our prayer book more than 45 years ago. And here we are today!

By the 4th century (our earliest documentation of worship practices after the Epistles), evening celebrations of Eucharist on Holy Thursday were on the rise. Paul’s account of the institution of the Eucharist (our Epistle reading on Maundy Thursday), and John’s account (John 13:1-17) of Jesus washing his friends’ feet were read, as they will be for us.

By the 7th century, ceremonial and liturgical reenactments of foot-washing grew more common. Also, on this day enough bread and wine were consecrated for Good Friday communions, since no Eucharist may be celebrated on that day. Ceremonial stripping of the altar concluded the liturgy, followed by a washing of the altar by the sacristans.

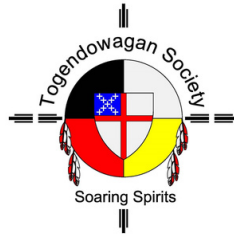
“Maundy Thursday” comes from the word “mandatum” (commandment) from the gospel: “A new commandment I give you, that you love one another even as I have loved you” (John 13:34). It became the tradition for Abbots to wash the feet of simple monks, for example, and landlords to wash their tenants’ feet. But, the first Church of England Prayer Book (1549) retained only the Lord’s Supper and the Paul’s Epistle reading, although outside the church, the tradition of “maundy” continued. In the “royal maundy,” on this day (common into the 18th century), the reigning monarch washed the feet of poor people.

In the 1979 Prayer Book revision, a “Proper Liturgy” is provided; ceremonial foot-washing is restored as an option. Provisions are made for stripping the altar, a ceremonial removal from the worship space of all decorative furnishing. The church is left dark and empty, save for the Reserved Sacrament for Good Friday’s “Mass of the Pre-Sanctified.” The sacrament is placed on an “altar of repose,” (in our chapel of St. Michael and All Angels) and the faithful remain with it until the first Good Friday service.

This “Gethsemane Watch” provides opportunity for “watching and praying” with Jesus (usually in shifts or watches) during his night of trial in Gethsemane. Our Maundy Thursday worship begins at 6 pm.

Togendowagan Society Reflection: The Potawatomi Story of Nêkmeshnak Gizesêk and Mkedewenêk

Some time ago; not in the homelands of the Three Fires, but in far-off land (Wiyetnam Shkote-éya bmadzewenêk — where the fire-air (heat/humidity) lives) where the fire-air lives, where the winds spoke with a strange tongue, there was an encampment of warriors. They had traveled far, and they had fought long, and their bodies carried the marks of many battles. Their lodges stood apart from the main village, for warriors must sometimes keep their own company. Among them was a young man called Nêkmeshnak Gizesêk, Stands in the Sun. He was strong in body, quick in spirit, and his heart was still soft enough to remember the teachings of the old ones.

One evening, when the sky was turning the color of embers, Stands in the Sun felt the pull of the village. He wished to hear laughter again, to see faces not hardened by war, to walk among the people as young men do. So, he left the warrior camp and followed the path toward the village lights. The night air carried the scent of wet leaves and distant cooking fires. When he arrived, he found a circle of warriors from another camp. Their voices were sharp like broken flint.

Curious, Stands in the Sun stepped toward them, thinking to share words, to make relatives, to pass the time in a good way.

But as he drew near, he saw that their sharpness was not from humor. They were harassing another young brave called Mkedewenêk (Black Earth Man), a man whose skin was dark, like rich earth after rain. He stood alone, surrounded, their words stinging like rain drops driven by strong words. Stands in the Sun watched, and in his watching he felt the old teachings settle in him like a stone dropped into still water; the teachings spoken by the elders when he was still small enough to sit at their feet.

He remembered the story of Earthmaker, the First Worker, who shaped the world and all that live upon it. He remembered how Earthmaker scooped clay and twigs from the riverbank and formed the humans, how he built a fire and placed the small figures within it.

He remembered:

- the first figure, baked too little, who became the white people;
 - the second figure, baked too long, who became the black people;

· the third figure, tended with care and patience, who became the red people, the ancestors of the Potawatomi.

And he remembered the teaching that followed: that none were made better, none were made lesser. That all were shaped from the same clay, all given breath from the same Creator. That the differences on the outside came only from the fire, from the heat of the world, from the conditions of their becoming.

As these teachings filled him, anger rose in Stands in the Sun, not the anger that clouds the mind, but the anger that clears it, the anger that comes when a teaching is being broken before your eyes.

He stepped forward. He did not shout. He did not boast. He simply moved, the way a storm moves when it has decided to break.

The warriors who tormented the dark-skinned brave did not expect him. They did not expect his speed, nor the strength in his arms, nor the fire in his heart. One by one, he subdued them, not to destroy, but to stop the harm they were doing.

When the dust settled, the circle was broken. Black Earth stood free. The others lay humbled; their pride scattered like leaves in wind. Stands in the Sun looked at them and spoke the truth he carried, and those words hung in the air, heavy and true, the way teachings do when they come from a place deeper than memory.

And so, the people remembered what Stands in the Sun had done, for his actions carried the weight of the old teachings: that all who walk this Earth are shaped from the saume dust and bear the breath of the same Creator.

And now, in the Lent season when the Church hears how Creator chooses not by outward appearance but by the heart, and how Christ opens the eyes of the blind so that all may walk as children of light, the people saw that same truth in Stands in the Sun.

As the Scriptures say, "From one ancestor He made all nations to inhabit the whole earth," and "Creator shows no partiality." In that light, we understand that Stands in the Sun's strength was not in his fists, but in a heart that could see clearly; seeing Black Earth not as others judged him, but as the Creator made him. And when he stepped into that circle, he walked in the way of the One who calls us out of darkness into light, who commands us to seek justice, rescue the oppressed, and defend the one who stands alone. In this way, his story became a teaching of its own, reminding all who hear it that though Creator's fire shapes us differently on the outside, His breath and His light make us one people upon the sacred Earth.

My first Easter as a priest

A remembrance by our Dean Emeritus and Canon for Christian formation, Fr. Steve Brehe

The Church of the Atonement in Chicago sponsored me years ago. Atonement, on the north side, was high church. I mean, really high. I kidded that our mission statement was to prove that the Pope was a Primitive Baptist. We had smells, bells, rosary, confession—the whole works. Members of the Chicago Lyric Opera would sing there on high holy days. Worship was truly uplifting and beautiful, if not a bit complicated. And, as some of you have probably noticed over the years, there's still a bit of the Atonement in me.

I was ordained a priest on March 24, 1980, at St. Mary's Church in suburban Park Ridge, which I dubbed "Our Lady of Middle America." It was quiet and proper, with middle-of-the-road worship. There I was, newly minted and ready to go "all out" for my first Easter just two weeks later. The rector, knowing my high church tendencies, suggested I celebrate the Easter Vigil. A dream come true! I threw myself into it with the unbridled zeal only a "brand-spanking-new" priest can possess.

The liturgy begins with the kindling of the new fire. Since it was too cold to be outside, I decided to bring the outdoors in—specifically, a charcoal grill. I fashioned a couple of dozen petroleum-soaked fire starters into a pyre. It wasn't just a fire; it was a launchpad. Flames shot up three feet toward the darkened rafters. I felt like Elijah on Mount Carmel.

It was glorious, right up until the point where I forgot the fire didn't just "go away." While we sang the Exsultet and read the lessons for an hour, the grill became an unauthorized smoker, blanketing the church with sooty ash.

When it came time to proclaim "Christ is risen!" I noticed black specks dancing in the candlelight. At Communion, the congregation looked like they had just finished a double shift in a coal mine; nearly everyone had soot on their fingers. Then I got it. The smoke from the "new fire" had drifted through the nave, coating the church and the faithful in greasy black dust. My Lutheran colleague, who happened to walk by that night, told me later he saw smoke billowing from the clerestory windows. "I thought you'd turned the parish into a South Chicago steel mill," he said.

The Altar Guild chair met me at the sacristy door afterward. If looks could excommunicate, I would have been gone. "We spent a week cleaning this church," she hissed. I didn't think I was celebrating the Resurrection; I thought I was celebrating the death of my career—perhaps the shortest tenure in church history.

We even wiped the soot off the Easter lilies—talk about gilding the lily. Tran, the family's father, proclaimed that the church should be renamed "Mary Khói" (Smokey Mary).

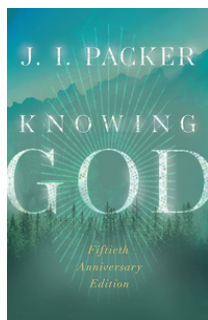
Easter morning came, and the church sparkled. The rector laughed out loud. The Altar Guild was mollified. I was exhausted. But I did not get a pink slip.

Family Updates:

Family 1: Mom, Dad, and their sons (6,2),and daughter(5) are staying at First Christian Church (FCC) due to the children's high needs. All three children have various physical, speech and developmental challenges, and their parents work tirelessly to ensure they receive the necessary services. The family is currently working with a budget expert to help strengthen their financial stability. Dad is employed as an assistant manager at Town Pump Express Car Wash, working split shifts during the week and weekends.

Family 2 - Mom (35), is currently first on the Helena Housing wait list and has visitations with her 6 year old daughter. She faces some mental health challenges, and Family Promise is providing additional support prior to each new rotation. Mom is on disability, does not have a vehicle, and enjoys reading and music. Megan, a Family Promise intern, meets with her weekly to help build life skills.

Family 3 - Dad (46), along with his two sons (ages 6 and 3),recently rejoined the program. He is navigating a difficult custody battle and is currently on workers' compensation following a shoulder injury from construction work. He supplements his income through DoorDash and is working toward stability by attending parenting classes, medical appointments and financial counseling.

Please continue to pray for FP families past, present and future as they tackle some pretty tough circumstances, for FP volunteers, staff and Board who work together in support of this ministry.

Stories of Faith in Action

Strength in Community: Hearing the Voices of Ukraine

At Wonderful Wednesday on March 11, our fellowship hall became a space of profound storytelling and witness. We were honored to host five Ukrainian refugees—Mariia, Anastasiia, Lydiia, Anzhela, and Veronica—who shared their journeys from the front lines of war to the mountains of Montana.

Stories of Resilience

Mariia opened the evening reflecting on how her life changed overnight when the war began. Now married and balancing roles at a local law firm and at On Broadway, Mariia expressed deep gratitude for her new home. "The United States gave me a safe place to rebuild," she shared, "the ability to continue my education, and hope for the future."

Anastasiia and her mother, Lydiia, both hail from Donbas, an area under Russian occupation for 11 years. Anastasiia arrived in the United States by walking across the border at the beginning of the war when they were temporarily allowing Ukrainian refugees to enter from Mexico. She was given temporary humanitarian parole (all of the others arrived through the now-suspended Uniting for Ukraine program). She recalled the surprise of officials when she chose Montana over a major city; today, she is thriving as an interior designer at SMA Architecture. While Lydiia has found safety here and works as a housecleaner—a humble shift from her former career as a bank CFO—her heart remains with her people. "I yearn to return home," she said, though she knows it remains unsafe to do so.

The Human Cost of War

The evening was a stark reminder of the personal toll of displacement. Many of the women have not seen their families or homes in years. Anzhela shared the bittersweet reality of having a two-year-old brother in Ukraine whom she has never met. With a grace-filled wit, Anzhela also noted how the term "alien" is often used for refugees. "Sometimes it feels like we are coming from a different planet!" she joked.

Our fourth guest, Veronica, shared how support from Carroll College allowed her to complete a BA in Sociology. She now serves our community through the Department of Health and Human Services. *continued on page 12*

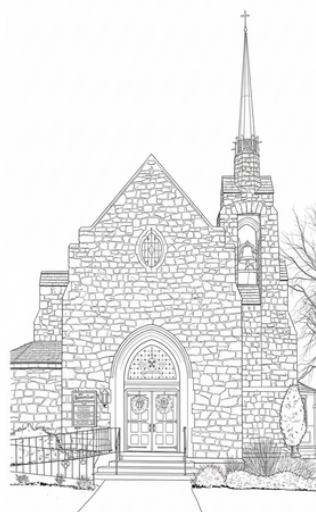
